Notice Regarding Termination of a Lawsuit Against Toshiba in USA

TOKYO— Toshiba Corporation today announced that a lawsuit brought against the company in respect of a nuclear power plant construction project in South Carolina, U.S.A., has ended with the plaintiffs withdrawing the complaint. Details of the suit were previously reported in a December 27, 2017 announcement, "Notice on Lawsuit Filed Against Toshiba".

- 2. Outline of the litigation and history

The plaintiffs were customers of South Carolina Electric & Gas Company, the principal and wholly-owned subsidiary of SCANA Corporation and Santee Cooper ("the Utilities"). Their complaint sought compensatory and other damages from Toshiba in respect of the abandonment of a project in South Carolina to construct two nuclear reactors at V.C. Summer Nuclear Station (the "Project"), owned by the Utilities. The plaintiffs claimed damages for costs that, they contended, were charged to them during the execution of the Project. The plaintiffs also sought to represent a class of customers of the Utilities who were alleged to have suffered similar damages. Toshiba contested the lawsuit, but in July the plaintiffs filed a motion for withdrawal. This was confirmed on July 29, 2020, bringing the case to a close.
